## NMSU Music Department Graduate Application Process Suggested Writing Assignments for Writing Sample

Papers must be written in a scholarly format and require proper documentation of all information in any accepted major format (MLA, APA, CMS, Turabian, etc.). Papers should be 4-5 pages in length (1,200 – 1,500 words), include a minimum of three score examples and should be drawn from a mixture of sources including books, current periodicals, program notes/liner notes, and various Internet resources.

## **Suggested Topics**

Option One – Composers of the Second Viennese School: Schoenberg, Berg, or Webern. Select one of the composers from this group. Offer a brief biographical overview, discuss the composer's major compositional contributions, and provide a brief technical discussion of one of the selected composer's art songs.

Option Two – Mainstream Twentieth-Century Composers: Stravinsky, Bartok, or Copland. Select one of the composers from this group. Offer a brief biographical overview, discuss the composer's major compositional contributions, and provide a brief technical discussion of one symphonic work or ballet suite.

Option Three – Minimalists/Post-Minimalists: Glass, Reich, or Adams. Select one of the composers from this group. Offer a brief biographical overview, discuss the composer's major compositional contributions, and provide a brief overview and selected technical discussion of one opera.

## **Goals/Objectives**

To evaluate the ability of the applicant to research a given topic and appropriately/effectively construct a scholarly paper that demonstrates an understanding of the material being presented, informs the reader, and provides substantive content in a well-organized manner within the proper style and with accepted documentation.
